Whether you're considering psychology as a future career or simply want to understand people better, these resources will give you a strong start.

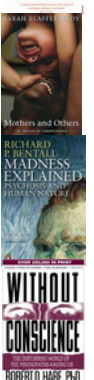
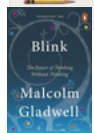
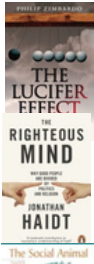

Royal Holloway Psychology Poster & Video Competition

Year 12 teams (2–5 students) submit a poster and a two-minute video on a prompt such as "How can psychologists promote healthier working environments in schools?"

Students write an essay on a prompt related to cyberpsychology (e.g. "How can technology support young people's mental health and wellbeing?")

Rewards include publication in an academic journal, a £500 cash prize, and editorial work experience.

Eduqas AS/A-Level Psychology Research Poster Challenge

Students submit research-themed posters demonstrating methodology and original ideas. Winners receive vouchers (£500 for first prize). Open to students across different exam boards.



Synaptic Essay Competition (NeuroSpark London)

Students write neuroscience-themed essays. The top 10 get published, and top 3 are converted into short videos. Encourages interdisciplinary topics.

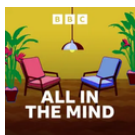

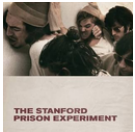
One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest (1975)

Explores the treatment of mental illness, the power of authority figures, and issues surrounding institutional care and human rights. (Film)



A Beautiful Mind (2001)

Based on the life of mathematician John Nash, this film gives insight into symptoms, treatment, and the personal impact of schizophrenia. (Film)



The Stanford Prison Experiment (2015)

A dramatization of Zimbardo's famous study—perfect for understanding situational factors and ethical issues in psychology research. (Film)



Split (2016)

Although fictional and somewhat sensationalized, it provides a basis for discussing misconceptions about mental health disorders and media influence.

Work Experience and Events



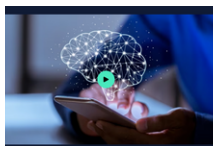
Work experience in psychology helps you understand how psychological ideas apply to real people, real behaviour and real situations. While you may not be able to shadow a qualified psychologist before university, there are many valuable ways to explore the field, develop insight into human behaviour and build skills that support future study.

Psychology-related experiences can include:

- University tasters, such as Springpod's Psychology sessions and virtual work experience programmes
- Care settings, for example volunteering in elderly care homes with organisations like OSJCT
- Children's charities, such as Barnardo's, offering insight relevant to educational psychology
- Mental health charities, including Swindon & Gloucestershire Mind, supporting those with mental health challenges or brain injuries
- Forensic psychology pathways, through volunteering opportunities with charities like Victim Support (age restrictions may apply)

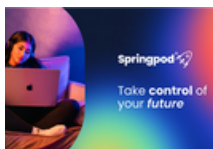
These experiences help develop empathy, communication, observation and critical thinking skills, strengthening applications for psychology courses and giving a realistic sense of the diverse careers within the field.
